FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

Dear Parents and Carers,

PARENT OPINION SURVEY

Our school is conducting a survey to find out what parents / caregivers / guardians think of our school. The *Parent/ Caregiver/ Guardian Opinion Survey* is an annual survey offered by the Department of Education that is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of families' perceptions of school climate, student behaviour, and student engagement.

The survey is optional, but we encourage all families to participate. Our school will use the survey results to help inform and direct future school planning and improvement strategies.

On Monday 29th July we sent out an invitation to all 353 families, so far we have had 29 responses which is a response rate of 8% of parents.

The survey is conducted online, takes only 20 minutes to complete, and can be accessed at any convenient time within the survey period on desktop computers, laptops, tablets or smartphones.

Please take the time to complete the survey as this is an annual opportunity for parents to give the school feedback on how we are going.

The survey period is between Monday 29th July to Friday 30th August. Parent Opinion Survey results will be presented to School Council in Term 4.

PARENT FEEDBACK ON STUDENT LED CONFERENCES

This year we trialled **Student Led Conferences** where students led the conversation to share with you their learning goals in numeracy, writing and the approaches to learning (social, research, thinking, communication, and self-management skills). We recently sent out a survey to all parents seeking feedback on the Student Led Conferences and I thought I would share some of the feedback with you.

Of the 84 respondents, 58% thought the conference time was too short, 66% preferred the conferences to take place after school over several afternoons, and 42% thought the conference gave them an understanding of where their child is in their learning.

The overall feedback from parents was they enjoyed the Student Led Conference, but rather than a scheduled conference, this could instead be a conversation between the student and parent and completed in an Open Day/ Afternoon. Parent feedback reflected a strong need to provide an opportunity to have Parent Teacher interviews to discuss their child's progress.

Thank you to those parents who completed the Student Led Conference feedback survey. This feedback will influence our planning for communication with parents and carers in 2025.

FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL CURRICULUM/PYP...

Exhibition

Our Year 6 students are embarking on their Exhibition journey. This is an exciting time for students as this experience is the culminating, and collaborative experience for students in their final year of PYP. The exhibition is a process for students to explore, document and share their understanding of an issue or opportunity of personal significance. All exhibitions are student initiated, designed and collaborative. Students will undertake their investigation both individually and with their peers. Throughout the Exhibition they will have opportunity to take responsibility for their learning and take action as they are actively engaged in planning, presenting and assessing learning. The exhibition has several purposes and provides students with opportunities to:

- Demonstrate agency and responsibility for their learning
- Demonstrate attributes of the learner profile in authentic contexts
- Explore multiple perspectives
- Monitor, document and present their learning in an authentic way
- Synthesise and apply their learning
- Take action as a result of learning
- Bring the school community together in a collaborative experience
- Be supported in their wellbeing by celebrating their transition into the next stages of their education
- Engage with the broader learning community

Foundation 100 Days of School

Last Thursday our Foundation students celebrated 100 days of school. This was a super exciting day. Students were greeted at the gate with a banner and balloons and then enjoyed the sparkling decorations that adorned their classrooms. Students came dressed in the theme bright clothes and party clothes to celebrate being 100 days brighter, and participated in activities relating to their 100 days of school. Students also enjoyed a special morning tea. Thank you to our fabulous Foundation team for making it a special and fun filled day.

Coal Creek

This week our Year One students visited Coal Creek as part of their Inquiry into their How the World Works unit with the Central Idea 'People use science to improve their everyday lives." Students participate in activities that enhanced their understanding of what life was like in the 1890s compared to now. I am looking forward to hearing about their excursion and all of the interesting information that they learned.

Curriculum

Each week I am privileged to join each year level to be part of their planning sessions. We discuss the learning that has taken place and will take place, ideas and resources to support learning, and ways that we will assess for learning; as students are learning and after learning. I thoroughly enjoy being part of planning as it enables me to understand what is happening throughout the school and to make connections between the learning in different year levels.

Teachers spend time developing *Learning Intentions* and *Success Criteria*. These support students to understand 'what' they are learning, 'why' they are learning something, and what they need to do to be successful in their learning. We also plan for the Approaches to Learning which are a set of skills students develop as they are learning. These skills support students to be agentic and self-regulated learners. Agentic learners: take initiative, express interest, express wonderings, make choices, are aware of their learning goals.

These skills include:

- Thinking skills
- Communication skills
- Research skills
- Self-management skills Social skills

Teaching students has many layers and team planning not only ensures that all students receive high quality teaching and learning experiences but also enables teachers to discuss their practice and share ideas.

Bullying No Way: National week of action



The National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence has a new name—Bullying No Way: National week of action.

Bullying No Way Week, 12 to 16 August 2024, is Australia's key bullying prevention initiative and connects schools and communities to find workable solutions to prevent bullying.

The week gives schools and supporters flexibility to plan activities which suit their schedule—whether it's spreading awareness throughout the week or focusing on an impactful day or two.

Purple is the new hero colour representing Bullying No Way: National week of action and our commitment to standing against bullying.

2024 theme

The theme for 2024 is 'Everyone Belongs'

When we all feel like we belong, bullying struggles to find a place. It's about embracing who we are, respecting everyone's differences and standing up together against unkindness.

Belonging means we all have a role in preventing bullying. We're encouraged to speak up and create a safe place where everyone feels supported and respected, and our voices are heard and valued.

Tips for at home discussions:

- Don't wait for bullying to happen to talk about it;
- Talk about what bullying is before it happens so children can recognise it and know what to do;
- Most importantly, let children know how to get help if bullying happens.

Children and young people are more likely to ask for advice and help with problems if they think adults are interested in them and their concerns.

When parents and carers spend time on a regular basis asking about what happened during the day and show genuine interest in their feelings and experiences, children will know that they can talk to their parents if they have a problem.

Check in with children often. Listen to them. Know their friends, ask about school and understand their concerns. Ask them about issues they tell you about, but don't feel like you always have to jump in to solve their problems. Instead, you can ask them what they think they can do about it.

It is important to be aware that children sometimes 'shut down' and become reluctant to talk if they are experiencing bullying and don't know what to do. Be alert to the signs of bullying. Sensitive and caring conversations about what is happening for your child can make a difference.

Bullying No Way Week at Mount Eliza North Primary School

Assistant Principal Reflection in assembly will focus on the definition of bullying.

Classroom circle times will focus on conversations around bullying- How to respond to the incident and help seeking strategies available in school.

STOP, GO, TELL strategy will be revisited in classrooms.


PROGRAM—YEAR 4

Students in Years 5 & 6 participated in a VCES (Victorian Challenge and Enrichment Series) workshop titled Unlocking Magic: Number Tricks.

The students, via Zoom with Monash Tech School, were invited into the world of the magician to learn how they trick our eyes with some of their magic card tricks. For this workshop students learnt the mathematics behind shuffling, experimenting with both an In-Shuffle and Out-Shuffle

(types of riffle shuffles) to see how these can be used to keep track of where cards move throughout the deck.

To explore in further detail, students learnt cyclic notation which they used to help work out how many times a deck needs to be shuffled in order for every card to return to its starting position. This workshop assisted students in unlocking the secrets to becoming a maths magician using sneaky numbers whilst challenging them to reason, reflect and decide what to believe or do next!


