PARENT OPINION SURVEY

Our school is conducting a survey to find out what parents/ caregivers/ guardians think of our school. The Parent/ Caregiver/ Guardian Opinion Survey is an annual survey offered by the Department of Education that is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of families' perceptions of school climate, student behaviour, and student engagement.

The survey is optional, but we encourage all families to participate. Our school will use the survey results to help inform and direct future school planning and improvement strategies.

Earlier this month an invitation to participate in the survey was sent to all families. So far we have had 87 responses which is a response rate of 25% of parents.

The survey is conducted online, takes only 20 minutes to complete, and can be accessed at any convenient time within the survey period on desktop computers, laptops, tablets or smartphones.

Please take the time to complete the survey as this is an annual opportunity for parents to give the school feedback on how we are going.

The survey period is between Monday 29th July to Friday 30th August. Parent Opinion Survey results will be presented to School Council in Term 4.

SCHOOL UNIFORM SUPPLIER - TENDER OUTCOME

Last month, members of the school council Tender Evaluation Team interviewed 4 potential suppliers for the School Uniform supply service at Mount Eliza North Primary School. Upon completion of the process Dobsons was identified as the preferred service provider and will officially take over in Term 4.

One of the main changes we were looking for was a supplier with a local uniform shop open on Saturday mornings with provision for online orders. Dobsons is in the process of opening a uniform shop in Mornington by the start of Term 4. This store will stock uniforms for all their local schools including Mount Eliza Secondary College.

In the meantime, parents can still order uniforms through the school uniform shop or order online until Wednesday 11th September which will be Uniform by Designs final day. Uniform by Design will be holding a sale on non-logo and non-exclusive school uniform items until 11th September.

We have not made any major changes to the school uniform, however after consulting with our SRC leaders from Years 2 – 5 we will introduce a new school jacket in the near future. As with any new additions to the school uniform, we will transition the new jacket in over several years with students still able to wear their current cardigan, jumper or jacket.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Lea Miller our uniform shop coordinator for all her work over her many years with us. We wish Lea and her family all the best as they move house to be closer to family and the city.

FROM THE ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL ... WELLBEING

As an excellent follow up to last week's action against bullying focus, I talked to the students in assembly about how to respond to incidents of rude, mean or bullying behaviour. This represents the STOP part of our Stop, Go, Tell strategy.

Here are some simple and effective comebacks that you can teach your children to use when dealing with bullying or mean behaviour. These responses aim to empower children by helping them stand up for themselves without escalating the situation:

- 1. "That's not true."
- When to use: When someone says something mean or untrue about them.

Why it works: It firmly rejects the insult without getting emotional.

- 2. "So what?"
- When to use: When someone tries to make them feel bad about something trivial.

Why it works: It shows that the insult has no impact and that they don't care about the opinion.

- 3. "You're not being nice."
- When to use: When someone is being mean or hurtful.

Why it works: It calls out the behaviour without being aggressive.

- 4. "That's your opinion."
- When to use: When someone says something negative about them.

Why it works: It acknowledges the comment but dismisses its importance.

- 5. "Why would you say that?"
- When to use: When faced with a particularly hurtful comment.

Why it works: It challenges the bully to think about their words and puts them on the spot.

- 6. "I don't have to listen to this."
- When to use: When the child wants to walk away from a situation.

Why it works: It sets a boundary and shows that the child is in control of their actions.

- 7. "I'm done talking about this."
- When to use: When the conversation is going nowhere or getting meaner.

Why it works: It ends the interaction on the child's terms.

- 8. "Let's do something else."
- When to use: When a situation might escalate, but the child wants to redirect the focus.

Why it works: It changes the subject and shows leadership.

- 9. "That's not funny."
- When to use: When someone tries to pass off a mean comment as a joke.

Why it works: It shows that the child isn't going along with the joke and sees it for what it is.

- 10. "I'm going to hang out with people who are nice."
- When to use: When the child wants to leave a negative group or interaction.

Why it works: It reinforces the idea that they deserve kindness and respect.

Tips for Parents:

- **Practice at Home:** Role-play different scenarios with your child so they feel confident using these comebacks.
- Reinforce Positivity: Encourage your child to stay calm and use these comebacks without anger or sarcasm.
- Empower Your Child: Remind them that it's okay to walk away and seek help from a trusted adult if the
- situation becomes too difficult.

Build Confidence: Praise your child for standing up for themselves and let them know they did the right thing. These comebacks help children respond to bullying with confidence and assertiveness, fostering resilience and self-respect.





